Current Project Proposals

Database #1—Gombiners and Descendants of Gombiners: This database has already been started, compiling the addresses of the households of all Gombiners and descendants of Gombiners. We hope that everyone in this database will also join the Gombiner Society, but that is not the purpose of the database. The purpose of this database is to keep a record of all Gombiner households, for genealogical research use. On page 4 you will see the names of the Gombiners already entered in the database. Please add your name if you are not on the list.

Database #2—Gombin Holocaust Survivors: Many organizations already have databases for compiling the names and stories of Holocaust survivors. Nevertheless, we would like to keep the names and survival stories of each Gombiner who survived the Holocaust together in one database. This database will serve only documentary and research purposes. We hope that all the Gombin Holocaust survivors will at least give us their names and a paragraph about how they survived. You may write as much or as little as you wish, being as specific as you can be. If a Gombin Holocaust survivor is deceased, we strongly urge their children to write as much as they know and submit that information to the database.

Database #3—Residents of Gombin in 1939: Realizing it would be impossible to compile the names of all the residents of Gombin in 1939, we would like to try to make a database with the names of all the people living in Gombin in 1939 before the Nazi invasion of Poland. If possible, we would like everyone who lived in Gombin in 1939 to submit as many names as they can remember, grouping households together.

Translation of the Gombin Yizkor Book: The Gombin Yizkor Book, published in the US after the Holocaust, is a storehouse of information for genealogical research. Many of us interested in researching Gombin could gain a lot from the information in the Gombin Yizkor Book. For those of us who cannot read Yiddish, the language in which the Yizkor Book is written, an English translation would be very helpful. The first task for this project is to locate copies of the Yizkor Book. Next, with the help of anyone fluent in Yiddish and English who is willing to translate parts of the book, the book will be translated into English. Chelmno Plaque: The site of the Chelmno concentration camp contains a wall of plaques in memory of those who perished in the camp. According extensive research, Dr. Leon Zamosc found numerous documents stating that the Gombin ghetto was liquidated in 1942 and all the Gombin Jews taken to Chelmno, where they were killed. In memory of those Jews, we would like to buy a plaque to be placed on the wall at the site of the Chelmno camp, using funds from memberships and donations. Restoration of Gombin Jewish Cemetery: The Gombin Jewish cemetery is today a field with a number of fallen tombstones, in a state of disrepair. We wish to set up a memorial in the cemetery to commemorate the Jews of Gombin. Fund-raising will be necessary, but we hope to get funds from Holocaust organization in the US, Israel and Poland. We do know that the land of the Jewish cemetery legally belongs to the Jewish community, according to a 1990 document we obtained.

All of these project proposals will be discussed at the August 11 meeting. If approved, work will begin on each project. Anyone interested in helping with any of the projects is urged to contact the person in charge of it.
